Course Title:

DRAWING -I (Studio practice)

Course Code:

BFAT 111 -

Credit Hours:

Course Outline:

(Common with the BFA Graphic Design students.)

This course seeks to develop the basic skills of observation and drawing through the systematic study of the models under different light conditions. From basic geometric shapes to human forms. Students are encouraged to show perspective and volume through shading.

Drawing is an essential component of the textile design programme and supports all the elements of design. Students are trained in observation, proportions, perspectives and nature drawing in pencil and water colour. The course focuses on various rendering techniques such as cut colour, dry brush and simplification of compositions through different mediums which include acrylics, poster colour and pastels (oil and chalk). The mixture of these mediums in one composition helps explore its diversity. An addition of perspective drawings and mind challenging exercises along with realistic still lives enhance the student's creative skills.

- Understand the purpose of drawing, to illustrate thinking process and ideas.
- Distinguish different types of lines and its characteristics.
- To achieve various angles in different shapes in freehand drawing.
- · Familiarization with different conventional and unconventional tools.
- · Discuss and critic on the work.
