<b>Course Title</b>	Introduction to Social Institutions& Civic Education				

### **Course Introduction**

This course examines the structure and function of social institutions and their impact on individual and collective behaviour. It covers the processes of socialization, the role of various agents in socializing individuals, and the complexities of social stratification. Special emphasis is placed on the role of government, civil society, and social institutions in Pakistan. Sr. No.	Elements	Weightage	Details
1.	Midterm Assessment	35%	Written Assessment at the mid-point of the semester.
2.	Formative Assessment	25%	Continuous assessment includes: Classroom participation, assignments, presentations, viva voce, attitude and behavior, hands-on-activities, short tests, projects, practical, reflections, readings, quizzes etc.
