Course Outline

Unit 1

Continuous Probability Distributions

Probability distribution of continuous random variable, its probability density function, distribution function, its mean, variance and moments. Some continuous probability distribution like uniform, exponential, gamma, beta, normal and Cauchy distributions alongwith properties and applications.

Unit 2

2.1 Bivariate Distributions

Joint distribution of two discrete random variables, Marginal distribution. Conditional distribution and independence. Conditional expectation and conditional variance. Bivariate normal distribution and its properties.

2.2 Transformation of Random Variables

Sum, product and quotient of random variables. Moment generating function techniques. Derivations of chi-square, t and F distributions and their properties.

2.3 Order Statistics

Distribution of the r^{th} -order statistics, joint distribution of r^{th} and s^{th} order statistics alongwith application.
