Dr. Khurram Qadir's Talk on Analytical Epistemology



On January 30, 2017, Dr. Khurram Qadir, former Director National Institute of Historical and Cultural Research, Quaid-e-Azam University, Islamabad visited the English Department to give a talk on "The Limits of Analytical Epistemology and Alternatives from Oriental Thought". The talk was attended by PhD scholars and faculty members. In his talk, Dr Qadir presented his critique of the western epistemological model and also offered examples of its Oriental parallel. In an engaging manner, the esteemed speaker discussed eastern cultural texts, particularly the Sufi poetry of Bullah Shah and Mian Muhammad

Bakhsh and explained how there are quintessential epistemological differences between these poets' outlook of the world and western academic analyses of epistemological work.

Dr. Anjum P. Saleemi on Confluence of Music and Poetry

The publication of the 6th edition of Dream Seekers - an annual newsletter - is a source of great pride for the Department of English. It is published not only to review significant activities held in the Department during the calendar year, but also to record some of the dreams that the faculty and the students were able to realize. Dr. Anjum P. Saleemi is a renowned linguist and a distinguished academic. He holds a Ph.D in Linguistics from the University of Essex in United Kingdom. He has also published a large number of research articles. On January 25, 2017, Dr Saleemi visited the Department and gave a talk on "Confluence of Music and Lyrical Poetry: How the Twain meet in East and West." The session began with the point of relationship between music and poetry, then with the help of some musical illustrations he explained that it is impossible to leave



out musical elements from poetry nowadays. The musical illustrations made the talk very interesting. Furthermore, he described at length the purposes, goals and functions of confluence of poetry and music. He concluded his talk by drawing a comparison between traditions of lyrical poetry and music in the East and West. The talk ended with an interactive question-answer session with students and faculty members.

Dr. Mahrukh Saeed Khan Conducts a Training Workshop at the Department of English



Award winning researcher and academic, Dr Mahrukh Saeed Khan from University of Auckland, New Zealand visited the English Department and conducted an interactive two day workshop for M.Phil and Ph.D students on the topic "How to Write a Research Proposal". Initially, she introduced her research interests and her own Ph.D dissertation on the theme of 'Motherhood' in the works of J. M. Coetzee. Then, she

shared her valuable insights on the art of research proposal writing. She reiterated the importance of writing a research proposal as it is essential to clarify, organize and navigate a researcher's road-map for conducting research. Moreover, she emphasized its importance in clarifying aims and objectives of the study. Furthermore, she stated that a research proposal facilitates in keeping track of the progress of research. Later on, she informed the students about the integral parts of any research proposal namely: Introduction, Literature Review, Methodology, Conclusion and Bibliography. She explained all the components of a research proposal in detail. She also trained the students in writing a compact and apposite abstract for their dissertations. Her lecture ended with a question-answer session related to various steps of research writing. After the lecture, she conducted one-to-one focus discussion sessions with PhD scholars to guide them in their respective research projects.

Farah Zia, Editor The News (Sunday) visits the English Department

Farah Zia, Editor of "The News on Sunday" came to the Department on March 21, 2017 to share her journalistic experience with students and faculty members. She began her talk by discussing creative writing and observed that journalistic and literary writing are closely connected with each other. She asserted that brevity and honesty make a piece of writing impressive and emphasized the connection that "to be a good writer, one has to be a good reader first." On being informed that students of BS are taught a subject related to journalism titled Journalistic Discourse, she opined that it will be beneficial for those who want to join media in future. Furthermore, she guided students on careers and internships in media firms. She expressed her hope to see trainings commence in newspaper agencies in Pakistan. She also



addressed the issues and challenges which women face in the fields of print and electronic media. She concluded her talk with the point of media bias in Pakistan followed by an interactive question-answer session.

BS (Semester VI) on a Field Trip to Head Suleimanki



BS Semester (V) went on a study tour to Suleimanki Headworks on January 14, 2017 under the supervision of Mr.Mir Waheed Akhlaq, Course Instructor of Visionary Discourse. Suleimanki Headworks are situated on the River Sutlej near Okara and were built as a part of the Sutlej Valley Project completed between 1922-1927 at the behest of the Nawab of Bahawalpur, Amir Sadiq Mohammed Khan \(\mathbb{\text{Z}}\) and the British Government. During the Partition when the Nawab of Bahawalpur decided to join Pakistan, the Headworks (located about a mile from India-Pakistan border) became a sensitive point of refugee crossover. The study tour was arranged in order to realise the strategic significance of the point and empathise with those who had to shuffle their lives across borders back in the agonistic times of 1947. The tour ended on students' attending a parade ceremony at the Headworks by the Pakistan Army.

World Poetry Day Celebrated at the English Department



The Department of English Language and Literature celebrated World Poetry Day on March 21,2017 with the moto "In celebrating poetry, we celebrate the resilience and fortitude of poets, and their ability to accentuate the beauty of the world around us". Dr. Saleem Mazhar's Talk on Asrar e Khudi





Dr. Saleem Mazhar, Professor of Persian Language and Literature at the Department of Persian, Punjab University, was invited to the Department on April 26, 2017 to give a talk on Allama Muhammad Igbal's famous philosophical poem Asrar-e-Khudi (The Secrets of the Self). The piece is included in the BS Semester VI course titled World Literature in Translation. Dr. Mazhar explained the key concepts of the Masnavi from its original Persian text with a special emphasis on the process of transformation (detailed by Iqbal in the poem) which an individual has to go through during his/her spiritual evolution. He also emphasized the significance of reading literature written in different languages as it provides students a better understanding of the world. He concluded his talk with the advice that students must cultivate the reading habit as it facilitates them in becoming thinking individuals and better human beings.

Scripture(s) and Literature: Ashraf Ahmad Ali's Talk





Mr. Asraf Ahmed Ali, an Alumnus of the English Department and Bureaucrat, visited on May 08, 2017 to give a talk on 'Background of Christianity in English Literature'. The gist of his talk was the relationship between scriptures and their subsequent references found in English Literature. He told the audience that all scriptures are closely interlinked with minor differences in the treatment of their shared subject matter. In order to substantiate, he quoted examples from the Quranic and Biblical stories of major prophets like Moses, Isaac, Jacob and Jesus. He further differentiated between English Literature and Literature in English and asserted that the former has always been influenced by both the Protestant and Catholic Church. According to Mr. Ali, the works of English literary stalwarts bear witness to this influence as John Milton's poetry, Donne's Divine poems, Spenser's Faerie Queene and Shakespeare's tragedies all contain examples of discreet usage of Biblical content. On the other hand, Literature in English is mostly free from this strain. He concluded his talk on a positive note that everyone who is sufficiently accomplished can create Literature in the English language by using his/her own techniques and methodologies other than traditional Christian ways adopted by British/American writers.

Samar Khan, the Cyclist at the English Department



Samar Khan, a Pakistani Cyclist and the first in the world to cycle on a glacier (4500 meters high Biafo, Karakoram) visited the English Department on May 02, 2017. Ms. Khan belongs to Lower Dir, KP and holds a Masters degree in Physics. She is a certified paraglider from Army School of Physical Training, Kakul. During her graduate studies, she discovered her interest in sports and learned cycling, paragliding, mountain biking, martial arts and trekking. She holds a national record of cycling 1000 kilometers at the height of 4693 meters to Khunjerab (Pak-China Border). She is a motivational speaker and a social activist who founded the "Pace for Peace" Foundation. In an interactive session with the students and faculty members at the Department, she related her journey of transformation from a traditional Pakhtun girl to a record holding cyclist. She shared with the audience her experiences as a sportswoman in the male-dominated society of Pakistan. She also pointed out the significance of sports and tourism in the promotion of national harmony. In the end, she urged students to put in all their earnest efforts towards realizing their dreams and keep striving for a better future of the country.
