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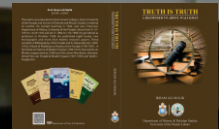

Mr. Ghazi Muhammad Abdullah programme coordinator briefed the students about the requirements of the degree.

BOOK TALK: THE PUNJAB BORDERLAND MOBILITY, MATERIALITY AND MILITANCY 1947-1987 BY DR ILYAS CHATTHA

The Department of History and Pakistan Studies arranged a talk on the book entitled *The Punjab Borderland Mobility, Materiality and Militancy 1947-1987* by the author of the book Dr Ilyas Chattha. He is currently based at LUMS. Previously, he has been associated with The Centre for Imperial and Post-Colonial Studies at the University of Southampton, United Kingdom. His earlier work was a micro-level study that examines the 1947 Partition violence, refugees' experiences, and urban regeneration in the Pakistan Punjab. It was during the field work for his first work when Dr Chattha found initial material for his second book. The new book is a path-breaking work on Punjab Borderland and provides important insights into how the new international boundary between India and Pakistan was made, subverted and transformed between 1947 to 1987. It is published by Cambridge University Press, UK. During the talk, Dr Chattha provided the students a brief overview of the book and encouraged the research students to spend time in archives and other repositories of historical sources to explore and write lesser-known histories.



SEMINAR ON KASHMIR: PROBLEMS AND PROSPECTS



Kashmir Issue has been a major bone of contention between India and Pakistan. While claims of India over Kashmir are grounded in legality of the accession of Kashmir with the Indian Union, Pakistan believes that the creation of Pakistan is incomplete without Kashmir. Pakistan, therefore, has been an active supporter of Kashmiri resistance against Indian occupation by highlighting Indian atrocities at

international forums. As part of solidarity with Kashmiris, the commemoration of Kashmir Day on 5th of February every year is a national event in Pakistan. In this connection, a seminar was organised by Ibn-i-Khaldun Society of the Department of History & Pakistan Studies on February 07, 2022. The seminar was started with the Recitation of Holy Quran. A Kashmiri folk song was sung. It was followed by the welcome speech of Muhammad Yasir, the President, Ibn-e-Khaldoon society. Prof. Dr. Khwaja Zahid Aziz, Chairman, Department of Kashmir Studies, University of the Punjab was invited as guest speaker for the event. Prof. Dr. Mahboob Hussain Chairman Presided over the event. The faculty members and the students of the department attended the Seminar. The guest speaker talked about the basics of Kashmir dispute. He also highlighted how the rights of Kashmiris being deprived, and what should the Pakistanis do to resolve them. He emphasized that the UNO and international community must play their role to resolved the Kashmir problem and that the issue of Indian domiciles must be cancelled over there. He said, the student's must get active on their social media accounts regarding the issue of Kashmir. Moreover, Dr. Mahboob Hussain gave a closing remarks by concluding the ceremony and thanking the audience and the speaker who came and joined the event.

SPECIAL SEMINAR REGARDING INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGES DAY

Ibn-i-Khaldun Society of the Department of History & Pakistan Studies organized an event to mark the International Mother Languages Day. The prime objective of the event was to make the students aware about the importance of their mother tongues and regional languages. It was attended by the



department faculty and students. It was presided over by Prof. Dr. Mahboob Hussain, Chairman of the Department. The event started off with recitation of the holy Quran. Mr. Asadullah, an M.Phil. student, made a speech highlighting the history and significance of Pashto language. He also read some poems of famous Pashto poets. A BS student delivered talked about the importance of Punjabi language, and the need to use it as medium of instruction and as a language of parlance in the Punjab. Zara Asghar, a BS history student, sang a Punjabi song. After Punjabi, Ahmad Waqar, a BS Student of the department from Sindh, highlighted some unique aspects and history of Sindhi language. Nirmal Munir and Inam Ullah, both M.Phil. Students hailing from South Punjab, then traced the history and salient features of Saraiki language. A documentary was also shown highlighting the importance of Saraiki language, its culture & traditions. Wahab Baloch made the audience aware of the dialogues, speech & history of Balochi language.

In the end, Muhammad Yasir, the President of Ibn Khaldun Society, talked about the significance of Urdu in the life and history of the Muslims of South Asia. He also recited verses of Faiz Ahmed Faiz. Prof. Ghazi Muhammad Abdullah made the students aware of the significance of one's mother tongue and regional and national languages of Pakistan. Prof. Dr. Mahboob Hussain, in his presidential speech, emphasized the role of language in the cultural life of a community and appreciated the organizers and the participants for organizing the event.

Talking to the delegation, Prof Dr Mahboob Hussain said that PU Department of History is one of the oldest departments of the varsity which is fully supporting the completion of this project. Prof. Rukhsan, director of Babur Legacy center said that the Babar Centre in the Department of History has been set up in accordance with the vision of the government of Pakistan.

She said that department would continue to play its role in enhancing relations between the two countries. She went on to say that it would open new gates of opportunities for both countries. Later, the delegation members along with the faculty members of History department visited the Punjab University Library, where they were taken to the different sections to see rare historical documents and manuscripts related to Mughal history.

SEMINAR ON WOMEN'S DAY



Ibn Khaldun Society of the Department of History & Pakistan Studies organized another event to mark International Women's Day. It was presided over by Prof Dr Mahboob Hussain, Chairperson Department of History and Pakistan Studies. Prof. Dr Ra'ana Malik, Chairperson Department of Gender Studies was the guest speaker. The event was attended by faculty members and a large number of students. A solidarity song with women was sung by Zara Asghar and a solidarity poem of Kaifi Azami was recited by Snober Gull. In her address, Dr Raana talked about the importance and respect of women in society. She highlighted

the role of woman as mother, daughter, sister and wife in the life of a man. She stressed that a woman must be respected, protected, appreciated, supported and guided as a woman. She pointed out some traditional and inhuman habits and perceptions of our men about women in our society. She said that we should acknowledge women as human beings and equal members of the society if we really want to live a progressive and successful life. We are incomplete without our women, she added. She talked about status of women in foreign countries where they were in good position. Prof. Dr Rukhsana Iftikhar, senior faculty member of the history department, talked about the status of women in Pakistani society. She raised some questions about the future of women in Pakistan. She emphasised that the women must be given their due rights according to the Constitution of Pakistan and our religion Islam. In his address, Prof. Dr Mahboob Hussain emphasized the role of women in the cultural, political, religious and educational life of any given society. He discussed about some major steps which have been taken by Government of Pakistan for uplifting of women in Pakistani society. In the end, he appreciated the efforts of Ibn-i-Khaldun society for organising this important event. During this event a free tea stall was also arranged for the students.

WEBINAR: CPEC TRANSFORMS PAKISTAN'S ECONOMY: LESSONS FROM HISTORY

The Department of History & Pakistan Studies organized a webinar on "CPEC Transforms Pakistan's Economy: Lessons from History." The guest speaker was Professor Mathew McCartney from the United Kingdom. Prof. McCartney spent twenty years as an academic working in one of the most prestigious institutions of higher learning including the School of African and Oriental Studies (SOAS), University of London, and the University of Oxford. He is a development economist with specialization in economic development of India and Pakistan.

He has published eight books and numerous research articles. His latest book, *The Dragon from the Mountains: The CPEC from Kashgar to Gawadar* was published by Cambridge University Press, UK in 2021. In his talk on CPEC's impact on Pakistan's economic transformation, Prof. McCartney explained why the support for CPEC in Pakistan is widespread and encompasses much of academia, the military, the mainstream political leadership, and civil society. Supporters, according to the speaker, argue that CPEC offers the potential to transform Pakistan and support rapid, equitable and sustainable economic growth. Detractors of CPEC argue that it will more likely tip Pakistan into a dependent debt-relationship with China and that it will facilitate more Chinese imports into Pakistan posing a threat to Pakistan's industrial base.

The talk was followed by a question answer session. In the end, Prof. Dr. Mahboob Hussain, Chairman of the Department, thanked Prof. McCartney for the very informative talk and hoped that Department of History will continue to organize such Webinar in the future.

SEMINAR ON: CREATION OF PAKISTAN AND THE ROLE OF PROVINCES



Ibn-i-Khaldun society with the collaboration of History Forum of the Department organised a well-attended seminar to highlight the role of different provinces of British India in the creation of Pakistan. It was presided over by Prof. Dr. Mahboob Hussain, Chairman of the Department. Aqsa Basheer, an M.Phil. student of the department, moderated this event. The seminar started with the recitation of holy Quran by Kushaal Akbar.

Arsalan Haneef, a student of BS History, provided a brief overview of the role of Punjab in the creation of Pakistan. While Shoaib Khan, a Baloch student highlighted the role of Baluchistan in the creation of Pakistan, Zeeshan Haider talked about the role of Sind. Majid Khan, an M.Phil. student briefed the audience about the important role played by the people of KPK (erstwhile NWFP) province. One national song was sung by Zara Asghar and Maham Rauf presented a nationalistic piece of poetry on the occasion. Mr Ghazi Mohammad Abdullah, incharge History Forum, synthesised the role of different provinces in the creation of Pakistan, in his talk. Mr. Ghazi highlighted the role of leadership of different provinces too. Dr Mahboob Hussain, chairman, Department of History & Pakistan studies, in his closing speech, described the efforts and sacrifices done by the people of different provinces in Pakistan who wanted to have a separate homeland for the Indian Muslims.

DR MUHAMMAD ALTAF JOINED DEPARTMENT AS ASSISTANT PROFESSOR

Dr Muhammad Altaf joined the department of History and Pakistan Studies as Assistant Professor. He got both his master and M. Phil Degrees from the department. Afterwards, he went onto to do his doctorate from Royal Holloway, University of London. His Ph.D. studies were jointly funded by Royal Holloway and the Higher Education Commission of Pakistan. The faculty members of the department also arranged a welcome dinner for Dr Altaf at the Punjab University Executive Club.



BOOK TALK: ISLAM IN SOUTH ASIA BY PROF. DR JAMAL MALIK



Another book talk was organised by the department on recently published monograph *Islam in South Asia*. It was a well-attended and an insightful talk. Dr. Jamal Malik, the author of the book and Professor at Erfurt University Germany along with Prof Dr Tahir Kamran from Beaconhouse National University and Dr Muhammad Raghieb Hussain, Principal Jamia Naeemia Lahore, spoke on the occasion. Prof Jamal Malik highlighted the salient features of his book and told the audience about the inspiration behind writing this book. Prof Dr Tahir Kamran in his talk congratulated the author

for focussing on intellectual, cultural, and social aspects of Islamic history of South Asia. Dr Raghieb Naeemi discussed the role of Sufis and religious seminaries in spreading and preaching of Islam in South Asia. He highlighted the importance of creating a balance between true Islamic perspective and cultural norms of the society in South Asia. There was also a question answer session. In the end Dr Mahboob Hussain, Chairperson department of History and Pakistan Studies, shared his views about the book.

NATIONAL HISTORY WORKSHOP: “EMERGING TRENDS IN HISTORY WRITING & TEACHING”

For the department of History and Pakistan Studies, the main highlight of the first half of the year 2022 was the one-day National History Workshop. It was held on 28th of March 2022. The prime objectives of the workshop were to highlight the importance of the subject of history, to explore and deliberate on emerging trends in historiography and teaching, to establish connection and promote cooperation among historians who are attached with the discipline of history in Pakistan and beyond, to revitalise the discipline of history on local and national level, and to provide opportunity



to young Ph.D. and M. Phil scholars to learn the art of history writing and teaching.

The workshop was inaugurated by the Punjab University Pro Vice Chancellor Professor Dr. Saleem Mazhar along with Dean Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences Professor Dr Amra Raza, and chairperson Punjab University History Department, Professor Dr Mahboob Hussain. The inaugural session was moderated by Professor Dr Faraz Anjum. In his inaugural speech, Professor Dr Saleem Mazhar said progress in the fields of science and technology is never complete without a parallel development in social sciences. Both sciences and social sciences go hand in hand to develop a better future. The role of history in this regard, according to him, is critical. He said the subject of history can also be influential in fostering Pakistan's relations with neighbouring countries. Specifically highlighting the significance of Persian language in the history of Sub-continent, he urged the participants to use classical Persian sources to revive and forge linkages between Pakistan and Central Asia. He congratulated Chairperson Dr Mahboob Hussain and his faculty members for organizing such a workshop to promote the subject of history.

Dr Amra Raza said the history is much more than just an outline of facts. She said that there was a need to promote academic collaboration between the fields of history, philosophy, and literature. Dr Mahboob Hussain, in his welcome speech, gave a brief introduction of the Department of History and Pakistan Studies, University of the Punjab. He said that the department was the oldest in South Asia. It was established in 1932 with J.F. Bruce as its first ever chairperson. Ever since, the department has been a prestigious seat of historical studies. He said that the subject of history was not given the importance it deserved in schools and colleges. He said that the workshop would provide a platform to Pakistani historians to deliberate on new trends in history writing and explore ways to work jointly. After the inaugural session, the participants read their individual papers in two parallel sessions. The theme of the academic session A was *Politics, Institutions, and Historical Sources*.

The academic session B was about Subalterns, Ideas, and New Tropes of History. In each session eight papers were read. After individual presentations, lunch was being served. In the second half, all participants joined together in a round table sitting to discuss and highlight important outcomes of the workshop. At the end, delegates unanimously favoured the recommendations to (a) organise regular history conferences and seminars on rotation basis, (b) establish a representative body of Pakistani historians. The name of the body could be "National History Forum" or "Pakistan History Society". The body will not be responsible to organise regular conferences and seminars but also to devise a mechanism to share list of topics that are being researched in each and every History department across Pakistan. New topics will also be shared annually to avoid repetition. An interim four membered committee was formed under Prof. Dr. Mahboob, Chairperson, Department of



History & Pak. Studies, University of the Punjab, along with Dr Rizwan Ullah Kokub, Dr Moiz Khan, and Dr Fakhar Bilal, to draft the constitution of the proposed representative body. It was also agreed that on the 75th anniversary of the foundation of Pakistan, a special document will be prepared which will include dissertations of students from different universities and colleges. The participants lauded the efforts of Punjab University Department of History & Pakistan Studies for organizing a fruitful workshop.



PHD AWARDED

Mr Muhammad Sohail Yousaf successfully defended his Ph.D. public viva and was awarded Ph.D. degree. The title of his PhD dissertation was "Politics of Incoherence: Factionalism in the Punjab Muslim League (1907-1954)". He completed his thesis under the supervision of Prof. Mahboob Hussain, Prof. Dr. Muhammad Shafique Bhatti from BZU, Multan and Prof. Dr. Farooq Ahmad Dar from QAU, Islamabad, were the examiners. Both appreciated the quality of his work and guided the student how best to improve it to turn it into a publishable monograph.

VISIT OF DR HARJINDER SINGH DILGEER

Prof Dr Harjinder Singh Dilgeer, Director Guru Nanak Research Institute, Birmingham, UK visited History Department, Punjab University. He is well-known historian who has written many scholarly books including *Complete History of the Sikhs* in ten volumes. He presented his ten volumes book on Sikh History to the Chairman of the department Dr Mahboob Hussain for the department's seminar library. The department arranged a dinner in the honour of Dr Dilgeer at the Punjab University Executive Club.



SPECIAL LECTURE OF PROF. WAEEL HALLAQ: THE ETHICS OF EMPIRE AND WEALTH: IBN KHALDUN AND THE MODERN STATE

Professor Wael Hallaq delivered the Inaugural Sir Muhammad Iqbal lecture. It was co-hosted by Department of History and Pakistan Studies, University of the Punjab with the University of Oxford. The Sir Muhammad Iqbal Lecture is one of the constituent initiatives of the Oxford Pakistan Programme, which brings to Oxford esteemed academics from around the world to deliver lectures on the broad themes worked on by Allama Muhammad Iqbal.

THE SCREENING OF DOCUMENTARY FILM “SEPARATION OF EAST PAKISTAN: THE UNTOLD STORY”

The Ibn-i-Khaldun society of the Department of History and Pakistan Studies arrange the screening of Documentary Film “Separation of East Pakistan: The Untold Story.” The film was researched and produced by Former Senator Javed Jabbar. A session of questions and answers was held after the screening. Prof. Dr Mahboob Hussain and Prof. Dr Faraz Anjum answered the questions. 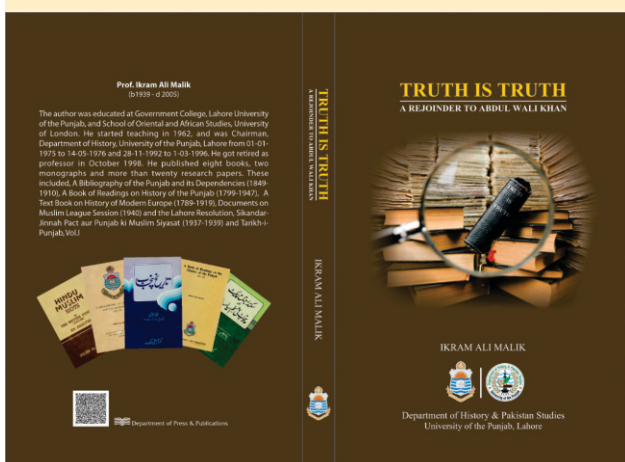
STUDY TOUR TO KHANASPUR

Well known historian Prof. Ikram Ali Malik, former Chairman Department of History, Punjab

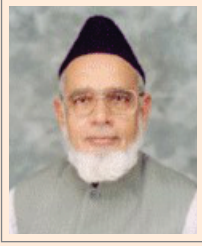
University wrote an important book entitled *Truth is Truth: A Rejoinder to Abdul Wali Khan*. It is clearly based on rare primary documents. The book was published 32 years ago in 1990 and was out of print. Talking about why there was a need to reprint this book, Prof. Dr Mahboob Hussain told that when he assumed the charge of the department as Chairman, he got a call from a senior journalist who wanted to see this rare book for one of his stories. A search of the department's library revealed that only one copy of the book was available. Realizing its importance, it was decided to republish this book so that it would be available in the market.

PHD SEMINARS

Ph.D. seminars are a regular academic activity in which research scholars present their work before the faculty and other research students of the department. It is also a HEC-mandated requirement of their degree. This activity helps them to get feedback from an academic audience to fine tune their arguments before the final submission of their dissertations. REMEMBERING OUR PIONEERS: PROFESSOR MUHAMMAD ASLAM (1932-1998)



He was a distinguished historian of Pakistan who excelled in the history of medieval India. Born on November 28, 1932 at the town of Phillaur in District Jalandhar, East Punjab in United India, he was educated in Lahore and did his graduation from Islamia College, Lahore, where he was mentored by such teachers like Mian Shams al-Din and Professor Hameed Ahmad Khan. He was also patronized by Prof. Muhammad Shuja al-Din who had a great influence and impact on his personality. He, then, got admitted in the Department of History, University of the Punjab, Lahore from where he did his Masters in History in 1955. After that, he went to Muslim University, Aligarh to pursue higher studies in history but soon came back as he could not adjust himself in the new environment. After coming back from Aligarh, he got admission in Karachi University where he started conducting research on the Mughal Emperor Shahjahan. However, without completing his studies, he left for England for higher studies. He got admission in Durham University, from where he did BA Honours in Islamic and Arabic Studies in 1960. In 1962, he completed his Masters in history from Manchester University, where he wrote a Master's thesis on Shaykh Ahmad Sirhindi. At Cambridge University, he studied under the mentorship of world-renowned scholars including A. J. Arberry (d. 1969). He spent four years there, and conducted research on the political thought of a Muslim luminary, Fazl Ullah ibn Ruzbihan Isfahani (d. 1209) and in 1967 he was awarded the degree of M.Litt.

Prof. Aslam joined the Department of History, PU Lahore as a lecturer in September 1967. He served the Department for almost thirty-five years, and worked as Professor and twice as Head of the Department from January 1973 to December 1974 and then from 1990 to 1992. Even after his retirement from the University in 1992, he continued to serve the department as a visiting faculty member.

Prof. Aslam got himself initiated in the Chishti-Sabiri *Silsilah* during the last years of his life at the hand of Mawlana Shah Abrar al-Haqq Chishti of Radauli, who was a *khalifa* of celebrated sufi, Mawlana Ashraf Ali Thanvi (b.1863-d.1943). He died on October 6, 1998 and was buried in Miyani Sahib Graveyard in Lahore. His daughter, Dr. Tanvir Anjum is presently serving as Professor at the Department of History, Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad. Prof. Aslam richly contributed to the discipline of history by his prolific writings on varied aspects of history. His academic works included books, and articles which appeared in leading research journals, magazines and newspapers of India and Pakistan from 1957 till his death in 1998. He mostly wrote in Urdu language. One of his greatest strengths as a historian was his in-depth knowledge of Arabic and Persian languages, which enabled him to directly undertake the study of manuscripts of medieval historiographical, sufi and other genres of literature without relying on their translations.
